State housing agency awards \$34,000 to fight, prevent homelessness in Brazos Valley region

(AUSTIN) — The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) today announced a funding award designed to Bryan-based nonprofit helping homeless residents in a seven-county service area secure permanent housing and strive toward self-sufficiency, bringing greater stability to individuals and the communities in which they live.

TDHCA awarded \$34,293 in grant funds to the Twin Cities Mission to help the nonprofit agency operate shelters serving homeless individuals and victims of domestic violence living in Brazos, Burleson, Grimes, Leon, Madison, Milam, and Robertson counties.

“While Texas has been spared the worst of the national recession, we continue to see unemployment numbers and home foreclosures rates higher than what we have long been accustomed to,” said Michael Gerber, TDHCA Executive Director. “The result is that far too many of our neighbors have no place to call home. These awards will work to end this trend and restore the stability and dignity that come with a permanent home to the lives of residents of the Brazos Valley region who lack this basic necessity.”

The grants were made through TDHCA’s 2010 Emergency Shelter Grants Program, which is funded by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. In addition to converting or renovating buildings for use as shelters, eligible activities include assisting homeless persons obtain permanent housing; providing medical and psychological counseling, substance abuse treatment, transportation and job training; and the development and implementation of homelessness prevention activities.
