

## IDD services and supports

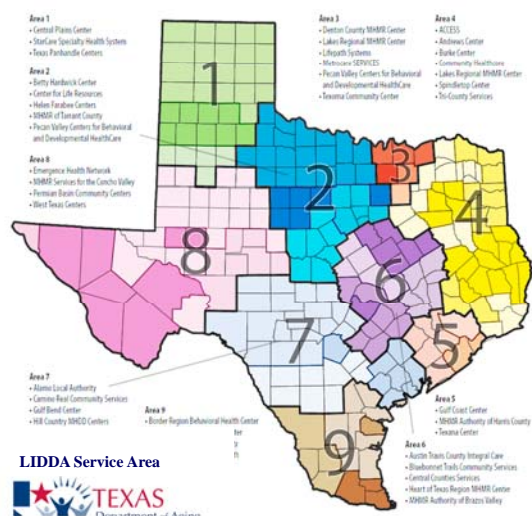
- Intellectual and developmental disability (IDD) services and supports are delivered through:
  - Local IDD Authorities (LIDDAs)
  - Intermediate Care Facilities for Individuals with an Intellectual Disability or Related Conditions (ICF/IID)
    - Community-based ICF/IID
    - State Supported Living Centers (SSLC)
  - Medicaid Community First Choice (CFC)
  - ICF/IID Waiver Programs
    - Home and Community-based Services (HCS)
    - Texas Home Living (TxHmL)
    - Community Living Assistance and Support Services (CLASS)
    - Deaf Blind with Multiple Disabilities (DBMD)

## IDD services unit

- The IDD Services unit contracts with thirty nine (39) local intellectual and developmental disabilities authorities (LIDDAs).
- Thirty-eight LIDDAs are community centers and one is a Council of Governments.

## LIDDAs

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LIDDAs serve as the single point of access to certain publicly-funded IDD services and supports for the residents within the LIDDA's local service area.

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## LIDDAs

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### LIDDAs are responsible for:

- Providing information about services and supports to an individual and legally authorized representative (LAR) or actively involved person.
- Registering individuals on the HCS and TxHmL interest list.
- Ensuring an individual's access into services and supports including facilitating enrollment activities
- Providing Service Coordination to individuals in nursing facilities, HCS, and TxHML.
- Performing safety net functions which may include providing services to ensure individuals can live successfully in their communities and avoid unnecessary hospitalization and institutionalization
- Ensuring the provision and oversight of general revenue (GR) services.
- Conducting PASRR evaluations for individuals in a nursing facilities who are suspected of having an IDD
- Providing specialized services for individuals in nursing facilities
- Provide community living options information for individuals residing in state IDD Facilities
- Conducting permanency planning for certain individuals under 22 years of age.
- Protecting and advocating for rights of an individual.

## Single Point of Access into Services

LIDDAs conduct the following activities that help individuals achieve access into services and supports:

- Provide information about services and supports
- Help individuals identify community-based services and supports or residential placement
- Conduct Psychological Testing to determine eligibility
- Assist individuals with enrolling into community based services and supports or residential placements

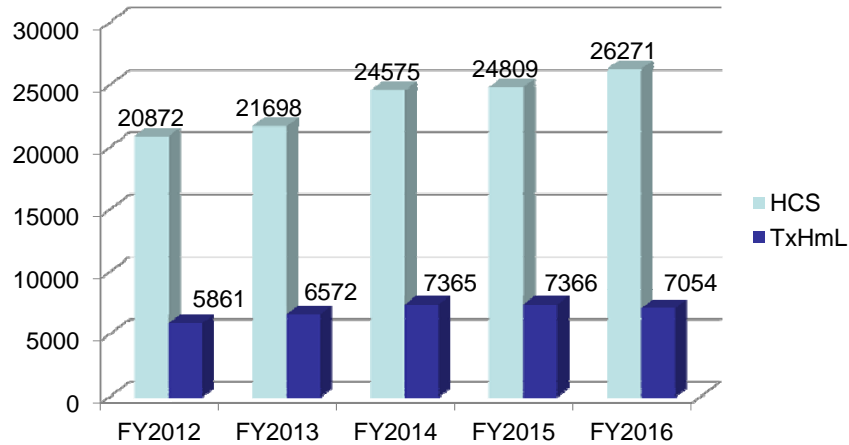

## Interest List/Enrollments

- Maintain the HCS and TxHmL interest lists by registering interested individuals in its local service area on the lists and periodically contacting them to ensure they are still interested.
- Offer HCS and TxHmL enrollment to individuals who are authorized by Health and Human Services (HHS) to receive the offer.
- Provide assistance so individuals can obtain financial eligibility.
- Conduct diagnostic assessments so HHS can determine individuals' functional and diagnostic eligibility.
- Conduct person-directed service planning.
- Provide service coordination, including on-going service planning and monitoring.

## Service Coordination

LIDDAs provide service coordination for:

- Individuals living in a nursing facility
- Individuals receiving services in HCS and TxHML
- Individuals receiving services through general revenue
- Individuals receiving services through CFC (Adults only)
- Individuals who have transitioned from a state supported living center or a nursing facility

Service coordination and planning includes:

- Identifying, arranging, advocating, collaborating with other agencies for the delivery of outcome-focused services and supports that address the individual's needs and desires as indicated by the individual and LAR or actively involved person

## Safety Net Functions-Transition Support Teams

- People with IDD who live in a Texas nursing home may have major medical, behavioral, and psychiatric needs that may keep them from living successfully in community settings.
- HHS has secured Money Follows the Person Demonstration Program funding to help individuals who have complex medical and behavioral needs who want to live in community-based settings get the services and supports they need.
- Because individuals with complex needs often require more experienced staff, HHS has contracted with 8 LIDDAs across Texas to provide support to other LIDDAs and community waiver providers in designated service areas.
- The 8 contracted LIDDAs have teams that offer educational activities, technical assistance and case review LIDDAs and community IDD waiver providers. The teams will have licensed medical staff, such as physicians, registered nurses, psychiatrists and psychologists with experience working with people with IDD.

## **Safety Net Functions-Crisis Respite**

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### **Crisis respite provides short-term respite for individuals with IDD**

- Out-of-home crisis respite provides therapeutic support in a safe environment with staff on-site providing 24-hour supervision in a setting for which the state provides oversight.
- In-home crisis respite provides therapeutic support in an individual's home when it is anticipated the crisis can be stabilized in a less restrictive setting and the crisis can be resolved within a 72-hour period.

## **Safety Net Functions-Crisis Intervention Services**

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- The 84th Session of the Texas Legislature provided funding to support individuals with an IDD with significant behavioral and psychiatric challenges.
- These individuals often exhibit significant needs requiring additional support beyond the array of services typically provided within community programs.
- This funding is to enhance current Mobile Crisis Outreach Teams (MCOTs) with staff who are trained in handling crisis situations with individuals who have an IDD.

## General Revenue Services

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- LIDDAs receive GR funding to support individuals in the community awaiting services in a waiver program.
- GR Services may include but are not limited to:
  - Respite
  - Service Coordination
  - Employment Assistance/Supported Employment
  - Day Habilitation Services
  - Community Support Services
  - Behavioral Support Services

## Community First Choice (CFC)

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- LIDDAS provide service coordination for individuals in CFC. CFC is:
  - A federal option which allows states to provide home and community-based attendant services and supports to Medicaid recipients with disabilities. This option provides states with a 6 percent increase in federal matching funds for Medicaid for these services.
- CFC services include:
  - Help with activities of daily living and health-related tasks through hands-on assistance, supervision or cueing.
  - Services to help the individual learn how to care for themselves.
  - Backup systems or ways to ensure continuity of services and supports.
  - Training on how to select, manage and dismiss attendants

## **Preadmission Screening and Resident Review (PASRR)**

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- A federally mandated screening process for all individuals seeking nursing facility admission
  - Screening administered to identify:
    - Individuals with a mental illness, or
    - Individuals with an IDD, or both
  - Screening and Evaluations used to determine:
    - Appropriateness of placement in a nursing facility
    - Eligibility for specialized services, if admitted
    - Eligibility for diversion and/or transition into a less restrictive environment including community based services and supports

## **PASRR Specialized Services**

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- Specialized Services are services for the Target Population in nursing facilities identified by the PASRR evaluation.
- Specialized services provided/coordinated by the LIDDA:
  - Determination of Intellectual Disability
  - Service Coordination
  - Alternate Placement Services
  - Employment Assistance/Supported Employment
  - Day Habilitation
  - Behavioral Services
  - Independent Living Skills

## **PASRR Specialized Services**

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- Specialized services provided/coordinated by the nursing facility but monitored by the LIDDA include:
  - Specialized Physical Therapy identified as needed by the Service Planning Team (SPT)
  - Specialized Occupational Therapy identified as needed by the SPT
  - Specialized Speech Therapy identified by the SPT
  - Customized Manual Wheelchair
  - Customized Durable Medical Equipment

## **CLOIP/Permanency Planning**

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### **Community Living Options Information Process (CLOIP):**

- LIDDA staff use state developed documents to help explain living options in the community to residents of state supported living centers.

### **Permanency Planning:**

- LIDDA staff conduct permanency planning which tries to create permanent living arrangements with an enduring and nurturing parental relationship for children who live in an institution. Texas law requires permanency planning for each child living in an institution who has a developmental disability and is younger than 22. Each child's permanency plan must include ongoing permanency planning goals and be reviewed at least twice a year.
